987TH FIELD ARTILLERY BATTALION LANDING ON GOLD BEACH

"Under lowering clouds and a threatening sky the 987th Field Artillery Battalion sailed beneath the Cliffs of Dover early on the morning of June 6, 1944. The four LST's threaded their way through the mass of shipping to make anchorage off the French coast late on D-day. Heavy seas prevented the landing of the unwieldy M-12's as scheduled on the second tide of the assault and it was not until the following day after a night of intense aerial fireworks, that the battalion landed. It went directly into firing position to support the British 50th Division in the vicinity of Bayeux. After the beachhead was firmly established the battalion reverted to the British 30th Corps, but not before they had made acquaintance with the famed "Desert Rat" (British 7th Armored) Division in a direct support role during the vicious fighting for Tilly-sur-Seulles."
