



WEEK IN REVIEW

- MOVEMBER 22, 1900: Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 216th Engineer Battalion is organized in Manchester as Company G, 7th Separate Infantry Battalion.
- NOVEMBER 23, 1863: The final battles of the Chattanooga Campaign begin when Brig. Gen.
 Thomas Wood's 3d Division, IV Corps, Army of the Cumberland, moves forward at the double quick from their fortifications to overwhelm the Confederates on Orchard Knob. Wood's 14,000 men included 10 Ohio infantry regiments and one battery of artillery.
- NOVEMBER 24, 1863: Maj. Gen. Grant sends three Union divisions, including nine Ohio infantry regiments and one artillery battery, under Maj. Gen. Hooker to attack the left flank of the Confederate Army at Lookout Mountain, Tenn.
- MOVEMBER 25, 1863: Following Hooker's success, Grant sends Maj. Gen. Sherman's Army of the Tennessee and Maj. Gen. Thomas's Army of the Cumberland against the enemy right flank along Missionary Ridge. Confederate forces were defeated and forced to retreat to Georgia, ending the siege of Union forces in Chattanooga.

NOVEMBER 25, 1940: Company C, 192d Tank Battalion is ordered into federal service for World War II. The Port Clinton unit would later take part in the Bataan Death March.

- Solution NOVEMBER 27, 1925: Company C, 1st Battalion, 148th Infantry Regiment is organized in Fremont as Company B, 148th Infantry.
- NOVEMBER 28, 1995: Companies B and D, 1st Battalion, 137th Aviation Regiment are organized in Columbus as Troops D and E, 2d Squadron, 107th Cavalry.
