National preparedness month 2011

What is it?

National Preparedness Month begins September 1st. It is a month-long campaign to increase awareness about ways to prepare for any eventuality natural or man-made. It encourages the entire community to ensure they are ready by having a plan in place and a "kit" of supplies in case of potential disaster. It also highly recommends that families stay informed by becoming familiar with their local first responders' disaster action plans for the schools, churches, businesses, hospitals and other entities in their surrounding communities.

What has the Army done?

August 2010 was the first Antiterrorism Awareness Month held to urge Soldiers, their families, civilians and contractors to be aware of, and prepared for, terrorist activities. On the heels of the resounding success of that campaign, the Army is actively promoting the readiness messages throughout the Army community when it comes to preparedness for disasters. The Army has instituted the Ready Army campaign whose motto is "Get a Kit; Make a Plan; Stay Informed." The campaign aims to create a culture and a mindset of preparedness throughout the Army and in our communities.

What continued efforts does the Army have planned for the future?

The Army will continue to place emphasis on preparedness through grassroots campaigns using all traditional forms of dissemination through social media outlets. Local outreach events, practice drills and school activities are also planned at various installations.

Why is this important to the Army?

During the high operations tempo of today it is sometimes easy to forget about day-to-day home life activities once back from deployments. The Army wants to keep Soldiers and their families ready, prepared and safe whether deployed or in garrison. A ready Army is a strong Army.

State of the Guard - full time defense - part time cost

Value to America

- The National Guard currently provides 35-40 percent of the Army and Air Force operational force for less than 7 percent of the base defense budget
- Most Guard equipment is dual-use; it can be employed for domestic and federal missions
- More than 400,000 Guard members are available to the state governors in the event of crisis
- Ten core competencies, known as the "Essential 10," are employed in support of civil authorities: command and control; chemical, biological, and radiological detection; engineering; communications; ground transportation; aviation; medical support; security; logistics; and maintenance
- Cost savings attributable to the community-based, part-time nature of the Guard include:
 - fewer pay days per year
 - lower medical costs
 - lower retirement costs
 - significantly lower training costs beyond initial qualification training
 - virtually no cost for moving families and household goods to new duty stations
 - fewer entitlements, such as housing and food allowances
 - lower base support costs in terms of services and facilities such as housing and child care facilities
- 75 percent of the engineer and medical capability is in the Guard and Reserve
- 80 percent of the logistics capability is in the Guard and Reserve
- 85 percent of the civil affairs capability is in the Guard and Reserve

The National Guard's accessibility, experience, and proven training enable it to efficiently respond across the spectrum of 21st century challenges.

The National Guard is uniquely suited with hard and soft powers for an era of irregular warfare that calls for versatile warriors and a whole-of-nation approach.

One of the ten major battles that shaped America

Gettysburg

In the spring of 1863 General Robert E. Lee, commander of the 75,000-man Army of Northern Virginia, decided to invade the North and perhaps force President Abraham Lincoln to negotiate peace. Lee and other Confederate generals had repulsed Union attempts to invade the South, but the North's industrial power and larger population would likely prevail if the war dragged on. Maj. Gen. George Meade, newly appointed commander of the Union's 93,000-man Army of the Potomac, engaged Lee's army at Gettysburg, Pa.

On July 1 the fighting comprised heavy skirmishing and cavalry clashes. By the second day Meade had created a defensive line south of the town. Convinced his infantry was superior to Meade's, Lee attacked. Both sides suffered heavy casualties at Little Round Top, the Wheatfield and other sites, but the Union lines remained unbroken.

On the third day Lee sent Maj. Gen. George Pickett and 12,500 infantrymen against Meade's center on Cemetery Ridge. Union artillery and small-arms fire inflicted heavy casualties and broke the attack. On July 4, after waiting for Meade to attack, Lee began a retreat to Virginia. Both

sides had suffered staggering casualties—a total of more than 45,000 dead, wounded and missing, almost evenly divided.

At first no one realized Gettysburg was a turning point in the war, which lasted another two years. But the Confederate cause had received a mortal wound, and Lee would never again attempt an offensive in the North. Lincoln added to Gettysburg's symbolic power by giving his greatest speech that November at the dedication of the battlefield cemetery. The Union—one nation—was preserved.

Retroactive traumatic injury no longer just for OEF/OIF injuries

Washington – As of October 1, 2011, the Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance Traumatic Injury Protection benefit, also known as TSGLI, will be payable for all qualifying injuries incurred during the period October 7, 2001 to November 30, 2005, regardless of where they occurred, and regardless of whether the member had SGLI coverage at the time of the injury. The Veterans' Benefit Act of 2010 removes the requirement that injuries during this period be incurred in Operations Enduring or Iraqi Freedom.

This is welcome news for the many servicemen and women who suffered serious traumatic injuries while serving stateside or in other areas outside of OEF or OIF during this time period, but until now have not been eligible for TSGLI. TSGLI provides a payment ranging from \$25,000 to \$100,000 to Service members sustaining certain severe traumatic injuries resulting in a range of losses, including amputations, limb salvage, paralysis, burns, loss of sight, hearing or speech, facial reconstruction, 15-day continuous hospitalization, coma, and loss of activities of daily living due to traumatic brain injury or other traumatic injuries.

Former Reservists and National Guard members who were injured during the retroactive period and suffered a qualifying loss are eligible for a TSGLI payment even if the cause was not related to service, such as a "civilian" automobile accident or severe injury which occurred while working around their home. The law regarding these payments covers these individuals 24/7. Additionally, survivors of Servicemembers who died more than seven days after their injuries are also eligible to receive a TSGLI payment if the member had a covered loss.

VA is working with VA and DoD Public Affairs to publicize this change in the TSGLI law, while the branches of service are identifying any retroactive claims they have denied because the injury was not OEF/OIF and outreaching to those individuals.

Secretary of Veterans Affairs, Eric K. Shinseki stated, "We at VA appreciate the President's and Congress' efforts to improve benefits to our troops. Now all of our nation's Service members who suffered severe traumatic injuries while serving their country can receive the same traumatic injury benefits, regardless of where their injury occurred."

Although applications are currently being accepted by Branch of Service TSGLI Offices, benefits will not be paid until October 1, 2011, the effective date of the law.
