"With God All Things Are Possible"

"With God All Things Are Possible" became Ohio's state motto on October 1, 1959. A twelve-year-old boy named James Mastronardo recommended this quotation from the bible during a contest sponsored by the Ohio legislature in the early 1950's to select a state motto.

The American Civil Liberties Union filed a suit against Ohio and its state motto in 1997, claiming the biblical quotation violated the first amendment to the U.S. Constitution which guarantees religious freedom separation of church and state. Federal courts allowed Ohio to retain its motto, ruling that the state motto does not endorse a specific God and therefore was not a violation of the first amendment. Four other states contain the word "God" in their mottos.

Ohio State Seal



Ohio has had an official seal for more than two hundred years and it has gone through several revisions, the last modification in 1996. The modern version the Scioto river flows between cultivated fields and Mount Logan. A rising sun with 13 rays symbolize the original thirteen colonies. A sheaf of wheat stands in the foreground as a symbol of agriculture and bounty. Standing next to the wheat is a bundle of 17 arrows representing Ohio's Native Americans and also symbolizing Ohio as the 17th state to enter the Union

Normandy

On the night of June 5 – 6, 1944, 160,000 Allied troops, backed by 6,939 ships, began to cross the rolling English Channel toward the Normandy coast of France in history's greatest amphibious assault. Wind, high seas and cloud cover on Jun. 4 had threatened to abort the operation, but, ironically, the bad weather had persuaded German defenders there would be no invasion for weeks, and many generals left to visit their families and participate in war games. By the time they realized the assault had begun, some 25,000 British and American paratroopers and glider forces had landed in Normandy to seize bridges and disrupt the enemy response.

At 6:30 a.m. the first landing craft slid ashore and tens of thousands of men stormed onto beaches code-named Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword. On Sword Beach, British casualties were light but the invaders ran into serious resistance inland and failed to secure their chief objective, the port of Caen. At Juno the first wave of Canadians suffered 50 percent casualties, but they penetrated farther inland than any other force.

On Omaha Beach some 50,000 Americans of the 1st and 29th infantry divisions confronted looming bluffs bristling with mortars, machine guns and artillery. Every officer and sergeant in the first company ashore died within 10 minutes, and only two of 16 tanks reached the beach. For a few hours Allied commanders considered abandoning the beachhead. But soldiers banded together in impromptu companies and fought their way inland, establishing two isolated footholds

beyond the bluffs.

On Utah Beach casualties were light, and the men of the 4th Infantry Division moved inland to link up with paratroopers of the 101st Airborne Division. By the end of the day the Allies had secured every beachhead except Omaha. In two more days it, too, was in Allied hands, and a new struggle began as the Germans poured in men and tanks. But it was too late to stop the invasion on the beaches. It took another two months of ferocious fighting for the Allies to break out of the peninsula; on Aug. 25, Free French and American troops liberated Paris, and the battered Germans retreated to the Rhine. By then Allied victory was only a matter of time.

If the Germans had flung the Normandy attackers into the sea and foiled the Allied invasion plan, the course of the war and the balance of power in Europe would have incalculably changed. As it was, the U.S. emerged from World War II a superpower.

The 2012 National Defense Authorization Act includes several provisions to ease the coming reduction in forces, but the defense bill also includes a provision for increasing the TRICARE Prime enrollment fee each year at a rate equal to the retiree cost-of-living-adjustment percentage.

Navy Purple Heart Policy Update

The U.S. Navy recently updated its policies concerning the awarding of the Purple Heart. Sailors and Marines may be now awarded the Purple Heart for certain mild traumatic brain injuries that were caused by enemy action.

If they suffered a loss of consciousness, or had to be given the disposition of 'not fit for full duty' by a medical officer for a period greater than 48 hours after a concussive event, they may qualify for the Purple Heart.

Purple Hearts awarded for MTBI will continue to meet the historical standards of severity applied to all types of wounds. For more information, read (<http://www.public.navy.mil/bupers-npc/>).

DoD Priority Job Placement for Vets

Civilian employees adversely affected by actions such as transfer of function or base realignment and closure may be eligible for assistance through the Department of Defense Priority Placement Program (PPP).

Depending on the situation, the program provides mandatory placement, matching eligible well-qualified employees to vacant positions throughout the DOD. For a PPP placement to occur, the registrant matched against a job vacancy must be well qualified for the position and certified by the current supervisor.

Motts military museum update for 2012

Motts Military Museum is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization that operates solely on memberships, donations, and sales from our gift shop and memorial brick garden. This is the time of year when we ask our members for tax-deductible contributions and also to renew their annual memberships. Please join the museum and/or contributing to its efforts to honor our nation's veterans and preserve history.

2011 saw an increase in attendance, as well as some substantial new exhibits. Motts museum recently put on display an OH-6 "Loach" helicopter that flew in Vietnam and present at the delivery were the pilot and gunner who actually flew that particular tail number in Vietnam.

The latest and greatest news, however, is Motts museum received a telephone call just yesterday confirming that the New York Port Authority has approved donating a number of items damaged on 9/11 at the World Trade Center. Warren Motts visited the storage hangar last month and selected a number of items, all of which will soon be received. Included are a police car and police SUV, a hook and ladder fire truck, a section of stairwell, a large

antenna from the top of one of the buildings, a marble sign with map from outside the buildings, and other items.

Motts museum is going to need substantial funds in the coming months to transport these items from NYC and to construct a new facility to display the 9/11 mementos. In the near future Motts museum will issue formal releases regarding its fundraising efforts.
