Ohio Air National Guard team helps ensure medical readiness during exercise in Korea

OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea— Nearly 40 Airmen from the 121st Medical Group from Rickenbacker Air National Guard Base, Columbus, Ohio recently trained here to team up with members of the 51st Medical Group.

The team, made up of doctors and medical technicians, came to Osan for two reasons: to help Airmen from the 51st MDG train and to set up an Expeditionary Medical System.

"We're here for EMEDS training and to help exercise and inventory the EMEDS here for the 7th Air Force and the 51st MDG," said Col. Michelle Gavin, 121st MDG commander.

The 51st Fight Wing has three core missions: defend Osan, execute combat operations and receive follow-on forces. As the 40 Airmen from the Ohio ANG arrived in the middle of Exercise Beverly Bulldog 13-02, members of the 51st MDG used the opportunity to realistically train on receiving those follow-on forces.

"We used this visit to practice receiving those bodies," said Col. Rawson Wood, 51st MDG commander, and 7th AF surgeon serving for all Air Force medical forces on the Korean Peninsula. "It allowed 40 members to arrive to the base under contingency operations and get in-processed and then to arrive in the MDG and reinforce the approximately 300 Airmen serving in the hospital. It was really key to receive these forces in the middle of the exercise to practice one of our three core missions."

After in-processing and providing support to the 51st MDG, the team headed to Suwon Air Base, just a few miles north of Osan to a set up an EMEDS.

"(We're setting up EMEDS) to ensure this could be a functioning system in case something happened here on the Korean peninsula that it needed to be used in a contingency operation," Wood said. "So if something was to happen on the peninsula where they needed to set up a hospital very quickly, and the equipment wasn't inventoried and maintained then it wouldn't be ready."

As part of setting up the EMEDS, the 40-man team built a tent from the ground up that would be used to house the temporary hospital, tested and inventoried more than 1,000 pieces of equipment worth more than \$1 million and ran through a few training scenarios to ensure the faculties were functional.

"I'm really enjoying being here and doing this mission," said Senior Airman Megan Betts, 121st MDG technician. "We are a part of (the Ohio National Guard) Homeland Response Force back home, and we do a lot of EMEDS training there, but coming out to Korea and training really helps with getting a feel for being in different environments."

The group of Guard members stayed for more than a week and took advantage of their time here by doing as much training as possible and experiencing South Korea to fully understand how important it is to be prepared and trained because something could happen here at any time.

"(My favorite part about this mission) is the teamwork and I love the capability that I can look at almost 40 professionals who I've never met before and not just by the uniform they wear, but by their capabilities and their past experiences I know that these are medics who I would trust to care for me or any of my loved ones in peacetime or contingency time," Wood said.

Ohio National Guard support to organizations and special events

As a result of federal government financial constraints, the U.S. Air Force has canceled all flyovers, orientation flights and participation in all air shows for the remainder of the fiscal year (through Sept. 30, 2013).

The Ohio National Guard is a proud member of communities throughout Ohio in which our Soldiers and Airmen serve. Through an active community relations program, the Ohio National Guard demonstrates it is a good neighbor and community partner by providing support in four basic areas: Non-Aviation, Military Aerial, Air Force Flyovers and Speaker Requests.

Note that most support requests require a minimum of 90 days prior to the event (unless stated specifically) to be reviewed, validated and considered for support. Requests received fewer than 90 days are unlikely to receive support.

The Ohio National Guard will make every effort to provide support for all events, but event organizers should be aware that support may not be available for military mission requirements may prevent the Ohio National Guard from supporting specific events and that there is a number of state and federal restrictions on how the Ohio National Guard can support organizations and events.

The Ohio National Guard Public Affairs Office receives, reviews and validates all support requests for their legal propriety.

Hagel orders review of DoD's new medal

Bowing to criticism, Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel is ordering a 30-day review of the order of precedence for the Pentagon's new Distinguished Warfare Medal, which critics have ripped because the award for actions far from combat ranks above others that can be earned only in battle.

Lawmakers and veterans organizations have written letters and publicly denounced the medal for its rank ahead of the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star.

Hagel has asked Gen. Martin E. Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, to review the policy and report to the secretary in 30 days.

This is a change for Hagel, who was awarded two Purple Hearts while serving in Vietnam, who had defended the medal's rank in a letter to various critics. His letter said the new medal, which will go to drone pilots, cyber warfare troops and others indirectly involved in combat, "recognizes a specific type of contribution that is vital to the defense of our nation."

According to a report in *Stars and Stripes*, he added, "It in no way degrades or minimizes our nation's other important awards or the tremendous sacrifices of our men and women who earn these prestigious recognitions."

Legislation in both the House and the Senate would change the rank of the new medal, which was announced last month by Hagel's predecessor, Leon E. Panetta.

The VA is committed to providing high-quality, clinically appropriate health care - when you want and need it. This commitment includes the ability to make appointments that meet your needs, with no undue waits or delays. We monitor the wait times for scheduled appointments, and give you the opportunity to complete a survey to tell us whether you received an appointment when you wanted one.

Sometimes, you may need to travel to another VA facility or a community care facility to receive the necessary treatment. If that is the case, your VA provider will work with you to find the place best suited for you to obtain the required services.

How do I schedule or cancel appointments?

Call your primary care/specialty clinic during regular business hours to:

- Make an appointment
- Change an appointment
- Cancel an appointment

If you know you are going to miss an appointment, please cancel it as soon as possible so that another Veteran can get an appointment.

What if I just walk-in without a scheduled appointment?

Although we will evaluate your condition if you decide to "walk in" to a primary care clinic without a scheduled appointment, you may have a wait, depending on the severity of your medical situation.

Retirement packets are mailed to your last known mailing address. If you change addresses before your 59th birthday, make sure you contact the office below so they will know where to send your packet.

You will need to send the packet back to receive your retirement pay. Make sure to include the following: NGB Form 22, DD Form 214(s), NGB Form 23, 20-yr letter and SBP election. If you are missing any documents, contact Ms. Jeanette Coughenour at 614-336-7038 (ONG HQs).

TRICARE offers ZIP code look-up tool

TRICARE now offers a zip code look-up tool to help you find out if you live in an area that will be affected by the Prime Service Area Reduction. This zip code look-up can be found at:

Beginning October 1, 2013, TRICARE Prime will no longer be available to beneficiaries living in certain areas in the United States. Prime Service Areas (PSAs) are geographic areas where TRICARE Prime is offered. PSAs were created to ensure medical readiness of the active duty force by augmenting the capability and capacity of military hospitals and clinics. The affected PSAs are not close to existing military hospitals or clinics and have never augmented care around military hospitals or clinics or Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) locations.

If you live in an area affected by the PSA changes, you will be notified by mail. Your letter will include information about your future TRICARE health care options and where to get more information. Your TRICARE Prime benefit will remain available through the end of September as long as your enrollment fees are paid, you do not disenroll early or lose eligibility.

Regardless of location, PSA changes will not affect:

- Active duty service members or their families who currently use TRICARE Prime and those enrolled in Prime Remote
- TRICARE Young Adult (TYA) Prime beneficiaries whose sponsor is an active duty service member
- Retirees or their families who already use TRICARE Standard
- Beneficiaries using TRICARE Retired Reserve, TRICARE Reserve Select or TRICARE For Life
