


U.S. Military Structure




United States Army Force Structure








Transport (C-130)





Where Our Personnel Live





Capabilities - Army



37th Infantry Brigade Combat Team

Federal Mission – *A rapidly deployable force of infantry, artillery and engineers capable of engaging and destroying the enemies of the United States.*

State Mission – *The brigade provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units.*

Strength – 2,245



174th Air Defense Artillery Brigade

Federal Mission – *Conduct integrated air defense during combat or peace-keeping missions. Also support mission providing air defense of National Capital Region.*

State Mission – *The brigade provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units.*

Special Troops Command (Provisional)

Federal Mission – *Provides internal and external logistical, administrative, recruiting, medical and training support to ONG units.*

State Mission – *Provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units and operates the Joint Forces Headquarters to direct domestic operations.*

Federal Mission – *Provide command and control, logistical operations and sustainment support to combat units.*

State Mission – *Provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units.*

16th Engineer Brigade



Federal Mission – *Provides general and combat engineering in area of operations to support maneuver units.*

State Mission – *Operates Joint Task Force 16, which is responsible for command and control of all state military assets deployed in support of civil authorities and provides engineer equipment and personnel for disaster response.*

73rd Troop Command



Federal Mission – *Provide command and control, administrative and training support to a variety of units.*

State Mission – *Commands the Homeland Response Force, National Guard Reaction Force, and 52nd Civil Support Team.*

121st Air Refueling Wing



Federal Mission – *Provide worldwide air refueling and airlift support to U.S. military forces utilizing the KC-135R Stratotanker.*

State Mission – *The wing provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units.*

Strength – *1,153 personnel / 12 aircraft*



180th Fighter Wing



Federal Mission – *Provides air combat capability in theater and performs the continuous Aerospace Control Alert mission to intercept aircraft violating security guidelines in U.S. airspace.*

State Mission – *The wing provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units.*

Strength – *1,033 personnel / 18 aircraft*





Capabilities - Air

178th Fighter Wing



Federal Mission – Partner with the National Air and Space Intelligence center to provide real-time intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance. While UAVs are not based at Springfield, base personnel remotely crew UAVs flying missions all over the world.



State Mission – The wing provides personnel to augment other responding ONG units.

Strength – 823 personnel

179th Airlift Wing



Federal Mission – Provide tactical airlift to both domestic and expeditionary missions utilizing the C-130 Hercules airframe.



State Mission – The wing provides domestic airlift capabilities.

Strength – 753 personnel / 4 aircraft (3 on station)

Geographically Separated Units

164th Weather Flight – Provides global, mission-tailored weather information to Army and Air Force ground or air operations.

Strength – 10 personnel

220th Engineering Installation Squadron – Installs long-term communications in the form of voice/data networks, ground-to-air communication and navigational systems.

Strength – 115 personnel

123rd Air Control Squadron – Directs air assets and provides surveillance of airspace, while managing all air defense activities.

Strength – 179 personnel

251st Combat Communications Group – Commands, organizes, equips, trains and administers assigned and attached forces to ensure support of emergency U.S. Air Force requirements.

Strength – 44 personnel

269th Combat Communications Squadron – Establishes initial and build-up command and control, communications and information operations capabilities.

Strength – 110 personnel

200th RED HORSE – Rapid Engineer Deployable Heavy Operational Repair Squadron Engineers.


Homeland Response Force & 52nd Civil Support Team

Homeland Response Force

Mission – Supports the incident command structure at chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and high-yield explosive and natural disaster incidents in order to save lives and relieve suffering.

Capabilities – casualty search and extraction, medical triage, mass decontamination, fatality search and rescue and internal force protection.

Strength – 636 Soldiers and Airmen



52nd Civil Support Team

Mission – Supports civil authorities at domestic chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and high-yield explosive and natural disaster incidents in order to identify unknown hazards.

Capabilities– Identify CBRNE agents/substances, assess consequences, advise on response measures and assist with appropriate requests for state and federal support

Strength – 22 Soldiers and Airmen





Capabilities - State

Ohio Military Reserve



State Mission – A state defense force authorized under 38 U.S. code section 109(c) and Chapter 5920 of the Ohio Revised Code. The OHMR is an all volunteer, un-paid force under the command of the Adjutant General.

Provides FEMA's Emergency Support Functions 6 & 7 capabilities to the ONG during domestic response.


State Mission – An organized, unarmed all-volunteer naval unit that has been serving the state of Ohio since 1896 based at Camp Perry Joint Training Site.


Ohio's Return on Investment

State Budget: Federal Funds at Risk



Each year, the entirety of the Air National Guard GRF appropriation, and a small percentage of the Army National Guard GRF appropriation, are tied to federal funds.

Those matches are usually three-to-one, meaning that for every dollar cut from the state match, we lose three federal dollars.

From 2010-2012, insufficiency of available GRF funds resulted in a loss of nearly \$4 million in federal funds.


Benefits:

Employment Initiatives

Transition Assistance Employment Support provides Ohio National Guard Service Members with vetted, quality information on employment programs, resources and services as well as individualized assistance to improve civilian employment outcomes for those service members seeking employment or looking for new career opportunities.



State Partnership Program



Links US States (in particular State National Guards) with the Armed Forces of partner countries to form bilateral relationships that strengthen ties between our nations.

Ohio is one of the few states that have two partnered nations: Hungary (since 1993) and Serbia (since 2006).



Each year we execute dozens of events with our partners, both hosting Serbian and Hungarian military in Ohio, and sending Ohio National Guard members to Serbia and Hungary.

Emerging Concerns



Solar Power

Issue: several ONG solar installations are producing more electricity than is being consumed. As a result, federal utility regulations could define those facilities as co-generators with certain financial requirements for the agency.

Fix: a working group will determine what regulatory or legislative remedies might be appropriate.



Cuts to the Ohio Air National Guard

Issue: Air Force proposed the retirement of the four C-27J aircraft assigned to Mansfield, and six KC-135 aircraft stationed at Rickenbacker. This results in a cut of nearly 650 jobs from Mansfield, and 200 from Rickenbacker.

Fix: Ohio has played a leading role in shaping Congressional opposition to the proposed reductions. As a result, the 179th Airlift Wing will receive a new mission and eight C-130H aircraft from the Air Force, resulting in a gain of nearly 180 new jobs.
