

WEEK IN REVIEW

- Tu** **DECEMBER 7, 1920:** Company A, 1st Battalion, 145th Armored Regiment is organized in Ravenna as Troop L, Cavalry.
- DECEMBER 7, 1993:** Company C, 1st Battalion, 145th Armored Regiment is organized in North Canton as Company C, 1st Battalion, 147th Infantry.
- F** **DECEMBER 10, 1874:** Company G, 237th Support Battalion is organized in Findlay as the Findlay Guards.
- Sa** **DECEMBER 11, 2006:** The coat of arms for the 155th Chemical Battalion is approved by The Institute of Heraldry.
- Su** **DECEMBER 12, 1776:** The Cavalry and Armor branches trace their origins to a regiment of cavalry authorized by the Continental Congress. Although armor didn't become a permanent branch of the Army until 1950, both branches share in the birthday of the Army's mounted formations.

PFC HARRY W. LEWIS' AWARDS

Pfc. Harry W. Lewis (1916-1987) served in Company C, 148th Infantry during World War II. Lewis's awards include the Bronze Star Medal (from left), Good Conduct Medal, American Defense Service Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal and the Philippine Liberation Medal. The Combat Infantryman Badge is also shown.

Lewis was awarded the Bronze Star for his actions on Feb. 8, 1945 during the Battle of Manila when he drove a truck through an enemy mortar and artillery barrage to evacuate wounded Soldiers.

Company C, 148th Infantry is an ancestor to Company G, 237th Support Battalion.
