 **WEEK IN REVIEW**

JUNE 16, 1775: The Corps of Engineers, Finance Corps, Quartermaster Corps and Adjutant General's Corps are all constituted by acts of the Continental Congress.

JUNE 16, 1902: Battery B, 2d Battalion, 174th Air Defense Artillery Regiment is organized in New Lexington as Company H, 7th Infantry Regiment.

JUNE 19, 1875: The 1192d Engineer Company is organized in Youngstown as the Iron City Guards.

JUNE 20, 1927: Ohio's first air unit, the 37th Division Aviation, is organized at the Central Armory in Cleveland. It had 101 men but no airplanes or building. The first-year anniversary of the unit marked the dedication of a new hangar at Cleveland Hopkins Airport and four aircraft.

JUNE 20, 1948: The 164th Combat Weather Flight is organized in Mansfield as the 164th Weather Station (Type A).

JUNE 21, 1860: The Signal Corps is established by the appointment of Maj. Albert H. Myers as signal officer.

JUNE 21, 1920: Company D, 1st Battalion, 148th Infantry Regiment is organized in Port Clinton as Company H, Tank Corps.

**PRIVATE JOSEPH O. GREGG**  
COMPANY F, 133D OHIO VOLUNTEER INFANTRY

**JUNE 16, 1864**  
**PETERSBURG, VIRGINIA**

The President of the United States of America, in the name of Congress, takes pleasure in presenting the Medal of Honor to Private Joseph Olds Gregg, United States Army, for extraordinary heroism on 16 June 1864, while serving with Company F, 133d Ohio Volunteer Infantry, in action at Richmond & Petersburg Railway, Virginia. Private Gregg voluntarily returned to the breastworks which his regiment had been forced to abandon to notify three missing companies that the regiment was falling back; found the enemy already in the works, refused a demand to surrender, returning to his command under a concentrated fire, several bullets passing through his hat and clothing.
