WEEK IN REVIEW

JULY 9, 1864: A makeshift Union force, which included six Ohio infantry regiments, under Maj. Gen. Lew Wallace attempt to stop Confederate Gen. Jubal Early along the Monocacy River, just east of Frederick, Md. Although the Union forces were defeated, the battle bought time for more reinforcements to bolster the defenses of Washington.

JULY 10, 1899: The 838th Military Police Company is organized in Warren as Company D, Unattached Infantry.

JULY 11, 1861: Brig. Gen. William S. Rosecrans leads a reinforced brigade, including the 17th and 19th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, to a victory over Confederate forces at Rich Mountain, Va.

JULY 11-12, 1864: After his victory at Monocacy, Gen. Early moved toward Washington D.C. and attacked Union fortifications around the capital. The 150th Ohio, a National Guard regiment in federal service for 100 days, was part of the forces that repulsed Early's attack at Fort Stevens.

The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress July 9, 1918, takes pleasure in presenting the Silver Star to Captain (Infantry) Clifford W. Morrow, United States Army, for gallantry in action while serving with Company L, 145th Infantry, 37th Infantry Division, in action against the enemy on 8 July 1943, at New Georgia, Solomon Islands. Capt. Morrow courageously left the protection of his own cover to rescue a wounded Marine Corps officer under exposure to heavy, enemy machine-gun and sniper fire. His gallant actions and dedicated devotion to duty, without regard for his own life, were in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.
