WEEK IN REVIEW

<u>APRIL 6-7, 1862</u>: Maj. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant's Army of the Tennessee defeats Confederate forces at the Battle of Shiloh, Tenn. Ohioans made up about one-fifth of Grant's army, representing 28 infantry regiments, five batteries of artillery and a cavalry regiment.

<u>APRIL 6, 1892</u>: The 1194th Engineer Company is organized in Chillicothe as Company H, 17th Infantry Regiment (Sill Guard).

Su <u>APRIL 9, 1865</u>: Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee surrenders the Army of Northern Virginia to Lt. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Court House, Va.

<u>APRIL 9, 1884</u>: Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 134th Field Artillery Regiment is organized in Columbus as the 8th Battery, Light Artillery.

<u>APRIL 9, 1942</u>: U.S. Forces in the Philippines, which included Company C, 192d Tank Battalion, surrender to the Japanese after four months of fighting on the Bataan Peninsula. The men would then suffer through the Bataan Death March before being held as prisoners until 1945. CONNECTING TO THE COLLECTIONS



NATIONAL FLAG, BATTERY H, 1ST REGIMENT, LIGHT ARTILLERY

Used by the battery prior to the War with Spain, this flag is marked with the unit designation. The modern Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 134th Field Artillery Regiment is the lineal descendant of Battery H. When the 1st Regiment was organized in 1886, the 8th Battery in Columbus was redesignated as Battery H and remained as such until it converted to an infantry company in 1904. The unit returned to the artillery branch in 1910 as Battery C.
