COMPANY A, 1ST BATTALION, 145TH ARMORED REGIMENT

Company A, 1st Battalion, 145th Armored Regiment was organized Dec. 7, 1920, in Ravenna, Ohio as Troop L. The troop comprised World War I veterans and was under the command of Capt. Perry Stevens. On Feb. 1, 1922, the unit was reorganized as Service Troop, 107th Cavalry, and assigned to the 22d Cavalry Division. In 1926, the troop moved into the new armory on North Freedom Street, which included a large indoor riding hall.

On June 30, 1929, the unit was reorganized as Headquarters Troop, 107th Cavalry. The 1930s brought with it the addition of mechanization, as the troop organized Scout Car and Transportation platoons. A further reorganization occurred on Jan. 5, 1939, with the redesignation to Troop F, 107th Cavalry. It was under this designation that the troop was ordered into active federal service on March 5, 1941, and sent to Camp Forrest, Tenn. for training. Following the attack on Pearl Harbor, the troop was sent with the regiment to Fort Ord, Calif. to patrol the west coast of the United States as part of Western Defense Command.

On Jan. 1, 1944, the 107th Cavalry was broken up and Troop F was reorganized as Company F, 107th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron. Company F was the light tank company of the squadron and was armed with 17 M5 Stuart Tanks. The company sailed from New York on Jan. 3, 1945, for France and supported the 66th and 103d Infantry Divisions in France, Germany and Austria during the final months of the war. The company was in route to the Pacific Theater when World War II ended, and the ship was diverted for the United States. The squadron was inactivated Nov. 16, 1945, at Camp Bowie, Texas.

Company F was reorganized and federally recognized in Ravenna on May 26, 1947. On Sept. 15, 1949, the 107th was reorganized as an armored cavalry regiment and Company F was redesignated as Tank Company, 1st Battalion, 107th Armored Calvary. On Sept. 1, 1959, the unit was reorganized as Troop G, 2d Squadron, 107th Armored Cavalry and returned to a tank company on June 1, 1974, when it was reorganized as Company M, 3d Squadron, 107th Armored Cavalry.

On Sept. 1, 1993, the armored cavalry regiment was removed from Ohio's force structure and Company M was reorganized as Company A, 1st Battalion, 107th Cavalry. The Army granted the State of Ohio an exception to maintain the historic cavalry designation for the new armor battalion, which was assigned to the 37th Brigade, 28th Infantry Division. On Sept. 1, 1994, the brigade was reassigned to the 38th Infantry Division. A new armory was built for the company at the Ravenna Arsenal and the unit was moved from Ravenna to Newton Falls on Nov. 1, 1998. The battalion returned to the assignment of the 28th Infantry Division on Sept. 1, 2002.

On Sept. 1, 2007, the unit was reorganized as Company D, 1st Battalion, 145th Armored Regiment. The battalion was reorganized as a combined arms battalion that included two armor and two mechanized infantry companies, along with a combat engineer company. The company joined the battalion on active federal service in 2008-09 for a mobilization to Sinai, Egypt as part of the Multinational Force and Observers peacekeeping mission.

On Sept. 1, 2016, the battalion was assigned to the 1st Brigade Combat Team, 34th Infantry Division of the Minnesota Army National Guard. The unit was reorganized under its present designation, Company A, 1st Battalion, 145th Armored Regiment, on Sept. 1, 2017. Company A mobilized from 2019 to 2020 to U.S. Army Central Command in support of Operation Spartan Shield, where it earned the Meritorious Unit Commendation as an element of the battalion. Across its 100-plus year history, the company has the rare distinction of remaining in its mounted warfare branch, either as a cavalry or armor unit.

Reorganized and redesignated 30 June 1929 as Headquarters Troop, 107th Cavalry



Reorganized and Federally recognized 26 May 1947 in the Ohio National Guard at Ravenna as Company F, 107th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron




Ordered into active Federal service 25 September 2008 at Newton Falls; released from active Federal service 29 October 2009 and reverted to state control

DISTINCTIVE UNIT INSIGNIA

Description/Blazon: A Silver color metal and enamel device 1 inch (2.54 cm) in height overall consisting of a shield blazoned: Argent, a bend wavy Azure between a falcon close and a cactus Proper.

Symbolism: The service of the original organization, the 145th Infantry Regiment, is indicated by the white shield for Infantry. The falcon from the arms of Montfaucon, France and the wavy bend for the Escaut (Scheldt) River symbolize the most outstanding feats of the regiment during World War I. The giant cactus represents service on the Mexican border.

Background: The distinctive unit insignia was originally approved for the 145th Infantry Regiment on 5 September 1928. It was amended on 27 November 1928. It was cancelled on 29 May 1935. It was reinstated and redesignated for the 145th Infantry Regiment on 19 May 1936. The insignia was redesignated with description and symbolism revised for the 145th Regiment on 15 April 1997. It was redesignated effective 1 September 2007, for the 145th Armored Regiment with the symbolism revised.



COAT OF ARMS

Description/Blazon:

Shield: Argent, a bend wavy Azure between a falcon close and a cactus Proper.

Crest: That for the regiments and separate battalions of the Ohio Army National Guard: From a wreath Argent and Azure, a sheaf of seventeen arrows Argent bound by a sprig of buckeye (aesculus glabra) fructed Proper (two leaves bursting burr).

Motto: EXCEL.

Symbolism: The service of the original organization, the 145th Infantry Regiment, is indicated by the white shield for Infantry. The falcon from the arms of Montfaucon, France and the wavy bend for the Escaut (Scheldt) River symbolize the most outstanding feats of the regiment during World War I. The giant cactus represents service on the Mexican border. The crest is that of the Ohio Army National Guard.

Background: The coat of arms was originally approved for the 145th Infantry Regiment on 17 July 1928. It was redesignated for the 145th Regiment with the blazon and symbolism revised on 15 April 1997. The insignia was redesignated effective 1 September 2007, for the 145th Armored Regiment with the symbolism revised.



SHOULDER SLEEVE INSIGNIA

Description/Blazon: On a black olla with a 1/8 inch (.32 cm) black border, 2 inches (5.08 cm) in width and 2 1/4 inches (5.72 cm) in height, a red bull skull.

Symbolism: The patch shape simulates an olla (Mexican water flask) symbolizing the 34th Division's origin, formation and intensive training site at Camp Cody, New Mexico in Oct 1917. The bull skull also symbolizes the surrounding dry, desert-like area. Black denotes durability, firmness and stability and red is for courage and action.

Background: The shoulder sleeve insignia was originally approved for the 34th Division on 28 June 1922. It was redesignated for the 34th Command Headquarters (Divisional), Iowa National Guard on 16 October 1963. The insignia was redesignated for the 34th Infantry Division effective 10 February 1991, and amended to add a border and provide a symbolism for the design.
