# BATTERY B, 1ST BATTALION, 174TH AIR DEFENSE ARTILLERY REGIMENT

Battery B, 1st Battalion, 174th Air Defense Artillery Regiment was organized March 18, 1910, in Hamilton, Ohio as Company M, 1st Infantry Regiment. On May 18, 1910, the company was transferred to the 3d Infantry Regiment and redesignated as Company E. In the summer of 1916, the company was mustered into federal service and sent to Texas to protect the U.S. border with Mexico. The company returned to Ohio the following year, but was retained in federal service for World War I.

On Sept. 15, 1917, the unit was reorganized as Company E, 148th Infantry and was assigned to the 37th Division. After training at Camp Sheridan, Ala. the unit was sent to France and Belgium. In addition to time occupying trenches in the Lorraine sector, the company took part in the Meuse-Argonne offensive in September 1918 and ended the war in Belgium during the final phase of the Ypres-Lys campaign. The company returned to Ohio and was demobilized in April 1919.

Company E, 1st Infantry was reorganized in Hamilton on Feb. 5, 1921, and was reorganized as Company C, 147th Infantry on July 1, 1921. The company underwent a series of redesignations between the World Wars, and returned to federal service on Oct. 15, 1940, as Company C. During World War II, the 147th Infantry deployed to the Pacific Theater and was relieved from assignment to the 37th Infantry Division in 1943. Company C was attached to various Marine Corps commands and spent time on Guadalcanal, New Caledonia, Iwo Jima and ended the war on Okinawa.

Following World War II, the unit was reorganized in Hamilton as Company E, 147th Infantry. From 1952 to 1954, the unit was on active duty at Camp Polk, La. for the Korean War. While the company was not sent to Korea, many of the officers and men were rotated overseas as individual replacements. The unit returned to Hamilton in January 1954, and was redesignated as Company C, 147th Infantry in September.

The Hamilton company continued as elements of the 147th Infantry during several reorganizations in the 1960s and 70s. On April 1, 1970, the company was reorganized as Company B, 1st Battalion, 147th Infantry and was assigned to the 73d Infantry Brigade in 1977. During the 1980s, the Buckeye Brigade had a wartime mission in defense of the Aleutian Islands. Company B participated in numerous cold weather training exercises during this period.

On Jan. 1, 1994, the company, which had spent 84 years in the infantry, was converted to a tank company and was redesignated as Company B, 1st Battalion, 147th Armor. Just a little over 10 years later on July 1, 2005, the unit turned in its M1 tanks for the Avenger Weapons System and was reorganized as Battery B, 1st Battalion, 174th Air Defense Artillery Regiment. Immediately after reorganization, the battery was ordered into federal service to perform a base security mission in Europe.

When the battery returned, the unit's station was changed from Hamilton to Woodlawn, Ohio. This change ended 97 years of calling Hamilton home. The battery returned to active service for a 2010-2011 deployment to Iraq to operate the Counter-Rocket, Artillery and Mortar system. The battery also mobilized to the National Capital Region in 2014-2015 and 2023-2024 to provide air protection over the Washington D.C. area.

### **HERALDIC ITEMS**



#### DISTINCTIVE UNIT INSIGNIA

Description/Blazon: A Gold color metal and enamel device 1 1/8 inches (2.86 cm) in height overall consisting of a shield blazoned: Per bend Gules and barry wavy of eight Or and of the first, in chief a pineapple of the second. Attached below and to the sides of the shield a Black scroll inscribed CAVEAT OPPUGNATOR in Gold letters.

Symbolism: Red and yellow are the colors used for Artillery. The pineapple is used to show service in Hawaii. The barry wavy symbolizes the Pacific Ocean and also represents service in the Western Pacific during World War II. The motto translates to Let The Oppressor (Hostile One) Beware.

Background: The distinctive unit insignia was originally approved for the 180th Antiaircraft Artillery Gun Battalion on 21 May 1952. It was redesignated for the 174th Artillery Regiment on 6 January 1961. It was amended to correct the spelling of the motto on 16 June 1969. The insignia was redesignated for the 174th Air Defense Artillery Regiment on 9 February 1973.



#### **COAT OF ARMS**

Description/Blazon:

Shield: Per bend Gules and barry wavy of eight Or and of the first, in chief a pineapple of the second. Crest: That for the regiments and separate battalions of the Ohio Army National Guard: On a wreath of the colors Or and Gules, a sheaf of seventeen arrows Argent bound by a sprig of buckeye (Aesculus glabra) fructed Proper (two leaves with bursting burr).

Motto: CAVEAT OPPUGNATOR (Let the Oppressor (Hostile One) Beware).

Motto. OAVEAL OF LOCKATOR (Est the oppiessor (Hostite only beware)

Symbolism: Red and yellow are the colors used for Artillery. The pineapple is used to show service in Hawaii. The barry wavy symbolizes the Pacific Ocean and also represents service in the Western Pacific during World War II. The crest is that of the Ohio Army National Guard.

Background: The coat of arms was originally approved for the 180th Antiaircraft Artillery Gun Battalion on 21 May 1952. It was redesignated for the 174th Artillery Regiment on 6 January 1961. It was amended to correct the spelling of the motto on 16 June 1969. The insignia was redesignated for the 174th Air Defense Artillery Regiment on 9 February 1973.




#### SHOULDER SLEEVE INSIGNIA

Description/Blazon: A rectangle arched at the top and bottom with a 1/8 inch (.32 cm) yellow border, 2 inches (5.08 cm) in width and 3 inches (7.62 cm) in height overall divided per pale ultramarine blue and scarlet, between two yellow lightning bolts radiating pilewise in base a stylized missile of the like; in chief a chevron of nine white stars and on either side of the missile head are four white stars in the configuration of a square diamond.

Symbolism: Scarlet and yellow are the colors associated with Air Defense Artillery. The Nike Hercules missile was the weapon last employed in the ground based air defense of the United States Homeland and represents the Brigade's resumption of this mission. The seventeen stars represent Ohio as the seventeenth state to enter the Union and is home to the unit. The diverging lightning bolts allude to radar acquisition and speed of response. Red is the color of valor and yellow/gold is emblematic of excellence. The blue is symbolic of the clear skies that the Brigade










